The saying for that I had to find the meaning was: 'People who live in glass houses shouldn't throw stones.' My first guess was that it was about a situation IN which those WHO want to fight should first think about defending themselves from attack. Obviously, a person WHOSE house is made of glass, WHICH IS something WHICH / THAT IS easily broken, should be careful. However, this saying, the meaning of WHICH / WHOSE MEANING I looked up in the Oxford Dictionary of English Idioms, is not really about fighting. It means that you should not criticize others for faults similar to THOSE (THAT) you have yourself. I think this is good advice for anyone WHO is critical of other people.
